Our new meeting room at the Spaghetti Warehouse is an excellent place to bring speakers and


guests. Hopefully, our monthly attendance and membership will continue to grow. We are still working out the meeting logistics with the staff there to make everything run smoothly.



Benjamin Rush was born on December 24, 1745 near Philadelphia. His father died when he was six, and Ben spent most of his early life with his maternal uncle, the Reverend Samuel Finley, who became his teacher and advisor for many years. Finley

eventually became the president of the College of New Jersey (now Princeton), an institution from which Rush earned a Bachelor of Arts degree. Rush later earned a medical degree at the University of Edinburg. He then practiced medicine in Europe, and at the same time learned French, Italian, and Spanish. He then returned to the Colonies in 1769 to open a medical practice in Philadelphia, while also becoming Professor of Chemistry at the College of Philadelphia.

Rush became very popular in the Philadelphia area, practicing medicine extensively among the poor. He also became increasingly caught up in the Patriot cause, writing papers and joining the Sons of Liberty and the American Philosophical Society. In January of 1776 he married Julia Stockton, daughter of a fellow signer Richard Stockton, and in July of that same year Rush was elected to Congress, signing the Declaration.

It was after he became surgeon general of the armies of the Middle Department that he made a controversial and indiscreet remark about General Washington after Washington had experienced a series of military defeats. Rush secretly campaigned for his removal as commander in chief, going so far as to write an anonymous letter to Governor Patrick Henry of Virginia. After he was caught and confronted by Washington, Rush ceased from any activities related to the war. He later regretted his criticisms of Washington. After independence was gained, he wrote in Philadelphia newspapers in favor of adoption of the Constitution, was elected to the Pennsylvania convention which adopted it, and was appointed treasurer of the U. S. Mint, serving from 1797 to 1813. His teaching and medical practice continued until the end of his life. Dr. Rush was the most celebrated physician in American upon his death, in spite of the fact that he clung to the practice of bloodletting long after the

Chicago is named after him. He died April 19, 1813. Interesting Story

Thomas Jefferson sent Meriwether Lewis to Philadelphia in 1803 to be tutored by Dr. Rush for the upcoming Lewis and Clark Expedition. Rush taught Lewis about frontier illnesses and provided the team a medical kit that included Turkish opium for nervousness, emetics to induce vomiting, medicinal wine, and fifty dozen of Dr. Rush's Bilious Pills, laxatives which contained more than 50% mercury. The expedition corps referred to these as "thunderclappers." Since their diet was rich in meat and short of clean drinking water, the Bilious Pills were used frequently. Archaeologists have found that the high mercury content provided an excellent trail to trace the actual route taken by the group to the Pacific!

Beliefs

- •Medical freedom should be put into the Constitution or the time would come when medicine would organize into an undercover dictatorship that would restrict the art of healing to only one class of men, denying equal privilege to others.
- The Bible should be used as a textbook in public schools.
- Scientific education should be made available for the masses.
- Slavery should be abolished.

Accomplishments

- Published the first American textbook on Chemistry.
- Succeeded Benjamin Franklin as president of the Pennsylvania Society for the Abolition of Slavery.
- •Consulted Thomas Paine on the writing of the proindependence pamphlet "Common

Sense," suggesting the title to Paine.

- Considered the "Father of American Psychiatry" (The emblem of the American Psychiatric Association bears his portrait.) due to his pioneering work in that field.
- •Helped to reconcile Thomas Jefferson and John Adams.
- •Rush argued scientifically that Negroes were not by nature intellectually or morally inferior to whites.
- Pioneer in prison reform.
