Battle of Cowpens 233rd Anniversary

Have you ever been to the Cowpens Battlefield? Have you been there in January? It is highly recommended that you bring some warm clothes, just ask David Martin!

The 2013 Battle of Cowpens Commemorative weekend is 18-19 January and begins in Spartanburg, SC. If your Patriot served there, this is a perfect time to visit. The visitors center has a video and display that details the battle. With only 25 Patriots killed, and over 800 British killed, wounded or captured, it is hard to describe how important this battle was for the War. You will also have an opportunity to attend a South Atlantic District meeting and meet other society members at a welcome reception on Friday evening.

Patriot Tribute

On October 12th, the 180th anniversary of the death of Patriot John Clarke, the Georgia Color Guard gathered at Marietta National Cemetery to pay tribute. Marietta historian Brad Quinlan related stories about Clarke.

John Clarke, son of well-known Patriot Elijah Clarke, was born in 1766 and supported his father in various campaigns of the Revolution. He also served in the War of 1812 as a Major General, commanding troops along the Georgia coast.

Clarke served in the Georgia House of Representatives and was chosen by the Legislature to serve as Governor from 1819-1823. In 1827, he and his wife, Nancy Williamson Clarke, the daughter of Micajah Williamson, moved to St. Andrews, FL, in the Western peninsula. He served as an agent of the Federal government. He died 12 Oct 1832 at the age of 66 from yellow fever, as did his wife.

They were both originally interred in a cemetery in St. Andrews Bay, but due to the development of the St. Andrews Bay area, they and two grandchildren were reinterred at Marietta National in 1923 with the help of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The original cemetery was replaced with a golf course.

John Clarke's grave is marked with both Revolutionary War and War of 1812 emblems. Members of the SAR assisted with the marking by the DAR in 2000.

Recognizing a Hero

13 October 2012

It was a beautiful Saturday afternoon and the beginning signs of fall were all around. The perfect day for a football game and yet, members of the Captain John Collins Chapter of The Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) were not at Shiloh Hills Christian School to cheer on the team. They were there to recognize a hero and as the three SAR members stepped onto the field, a young man (a member of the football team) was standing on the sideline. This young man was the reason for their visit.

Adam Smothers, just seventeen at the time, stepped forward on June 11th while vacationing in Panama City Beach, Florida and rescued two men caught in a rip tide and in desperate need of help. Adam heard a voice off shore screaming for help and without any thought for his own safety, he swam out to help the man and while helping the victim to shore, he heard a second voice calling for help. After towing the first man to shore, Adam went out to help the second man and as Adam was bringing this second victim who was passing in and out of consciousness toward shore, the current shifted and Adam was able to save him.



Through this act of bravery, Adam Smothers exhibited the very characteristics of those who established the United States of America and those who throughout our history have made America the greatest Nation on God's green Earth. This is why Wayne Brown, Larry Guzy, and Terry Gibbs of the Captain John Collins SAR Chapter were there to present Adam with the Medal for Heroism.



An Amazing Patriot

David Kinnison was born on November 17, 1736 in Old Kingston, Maine. An early convert to the cause of American independence, he participated in the dumping of tea into Boston Harbor, an escalation of resistance to British rule that would come to be known as the Boston Tea Party. After serving in the Revolution and being taken captive by Mohawk Indians, he returned to farming. Still vigorous at the age of 75, he rejoined the military to fight in the War of 1812. The last survivor of the Tea Party, David Kinnison had 22 children and out-lived four wives. When he died at 114 in 1851, the nation he had helped give birth was only a few years away from being divided by Civil War.
