Note that to fully participate, you will need to register. Full Registration is \$285.00 for each attendee including spouses, HOWEVER, there will not be another Congress for a long time that will be so close that you would not need to be at a hotel. You would never be able to fully attend for so little. We encourage your full participation, but even if you do not register, you can help and participate by working.

The Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence and

Its Significance to the American Revolution

As Americans, we are all very familiar with the struggle that our nation faced to gain independence from the oppressive reign of Great Britain. The adoption of the

Declaration of Independence by the Continental Congress on July 4th, 1776 was one of America's key milestones that it reached on its way to becoming the wealthy, powerful, and freedomloving country that it is today. The Declaration of Independence is a pinnacle of American courage and commitment, and it was something that united the nation in a common cause; to gain status as an independent nation that was free to govern itself as it saw fit.

As significant as the Declaration of Independence was, it was not the first act of political dissention taken against the British Government. There was, in fact, a Declaration of Independence that stemmed from

Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, that preceded the official Declaration of Independence. Although there is a degree of controversy surrounding the authenticity of the Declaration, many professional historians agree that the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence was a genuine document that listed many grievances against King George the third and the parliament of Great Britain. Most historians agree that the Document was drafted on May 20, 1775 by a committee that consisted of two men from each militia company in the Mecklenburg area who came together to discuss what should be done in response to the recently fought battles of Lexington and Concord. It was signed and thus lent support by the members of the committee that created it as well as a few dozen citizens of Mecklenburg County.

Although it fell short of actually declaring independence for Mecklenburg, or any other area of the colonies, the document expressed that Great Britain had invaded the inalienable rights of the American colonies and could no longer be looked at as a "mother country." The declaration indeed states that anyone who sympathized or

sided with Great Britain "is an enemy to this County, to America, and to the inherent and inalienable rights of man." (Graham) Another key point that it makes is that the colonies and their

> citizens should do their best to dissolve their ties with Britain and "use every exertion to spread the love of country and fire of freedom throughout America." (Graham)

The significance of the Mecklenburg Declaration lies in its timing. Although it was not as potent as the Declaration of Independence, it shows that anti-British sentiments were at a boiling point well over a year before the colonies officially became the United States. The fact that it was written by common militiamen and signed by ordinary citizens is a sign of the true

grassroots movements that initiated the Revolutionary War. The Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence signifies that in addition to physically fighting the British government in the battles of Lexington and Concord, factions of the American colonies were willing to make permanent political changes. The most important of these was a complete separation with Great Britain.
