The Guns of Ticonderoga

America Gets Artillery

The American Revolution would see quite a few men rise to prominence who never would have had a chance to distinguish themselves under the British class system. These men started life in relative obscurity, but the Revolution, and more importantly, their association with General Washington, would make them into national heroes. Washington had a reputation for being a great judge of character and ability. An American meritocracy developed during the Revolutionary War. Such men as Henry Morgan, Nathaniel Greene, Alexander Hamilton, the Marquis de LaFayette, and Henry Knox, all who served as Washington's most trusted lieutenants would become household names in the new nation.

Henry Knox began his career as a bookseller in Boston. And he read! Especially books on artillery and fortifications. When the Siege of Boston began after the battles of Lexington and Concord, General Ward and his staff turned to Henry Knox to begin planning the fortifications to surround Boston.


Henry Knox met General Washington for the first time on 6 Jul 1775. Washington was impressed with Knox's positioning of the fortifications. This meeting began a lifelong friendship between the two men.

Recall that on 10 May 1775, Ethan Allen and Benedict Arnold had captured the unsuspecting British garrison at Ft. Ticonderoga along with all the cannon. Either Henry Knox or Benedict Arnold brought it to General Washington's attention to retrieve the cannon and bring them to Boston.

Here are the milestones of that famous trek!

16 Nov 1775—General Washington issues orders to Henry Knox to procure the cannon from Ft. Ticonderoga. See page 3 for the wording of the orders to Knox.

 $1\ \mathrm{Dec}\ 1775-\mathrm{Henry}\ \mathrm{Knox}$ reaches Albany, NY and confers with General Schuyler about how to transport the guns from Ticonderoga.

5 Dec 1775 – Henry Knox arrives at Ft. Ticonderoga

9 Dec 1775 – Henry Knox selects 59 pieces of artillery, along with 23 boxes of lead. The total cargo weighs 60 tons. They depart Ft. Ticonderoga and sail south down Lake George. They will encounter difficult winds sailing on the lake.

17 Dec 1775 – Henry Knox reaches Ft. George, at the south end of Lake George. He writes a letter to General Washington informing him of their progress, and refers to his cargo as "a noble train of artillery".

2 Jan 1776 - While crossing the iced-over Mohawk River, one of the cannon crashes through the ice, but it is recovered.

6 Jan 1776 - They cross the frozen Hudson River at Albany

10 Jan 1776 – They reach the Berkshire Mountains in western Massachusetts.


24 Jan 1776- The Knox expedition arrives at General Washington's headquarters in Cambridge, $\ensuremath{\mathsf{MA}}$

16 Feb 1776 -George Washington holds a Council of War where it is decided to capture Dorchester Heights and set up the newly acquired artillery. The date is set for March 4th. 4 Mar 1776 – General John Thomas with 2000 men occupy Dorchester Heights and erect fortifications. The cannon are then positioned, overlooking Boston and Boston Harbor. 7 Mar 1776 – After debating whether to assault Dorchester Heights, Gen Howe decides it would be another bloody battle and decides instead to evacuate Boston.

17 Mar 1776 – Evacuation Day. Ay, t'is St. Paddy's Day! The British evacuate Boston...never to return!

You are immediately to examine into the state of artillery of this army, and take an account of the cannon, mortars, shells, lead, and ammunition that are wanting; when you have done that, you are to proceed in the most expeditious manner to New York; there apply to the president of the Provincial Congress, and learn of him whether Col. Reed did anything, or left any orders respecting these things, and get him to procure such of them as can possibly be had there. The president, if he can, will have them immediately sent hither; if he cannot, you must put them in a proper channel for being transported to this camp with despatch before you leave New York. After you have procured as many of these necessaries as you can there, you must go to Major-General Schuyler and get the remainder from Ticonderoga, Crown Point, or St. John's; if it should be necessary, from Quebec, if in our hands. The want of them is so great, that no trouble or expense must be spared to obtain them. I have wrote to General Schuyler, he will give every necessary assistance, that they may be had and forwarded to this place with the utmost despatch. I have given you a warrant to the Paymaster-General of the Continental Array, for a thousand dollars, to defray the expense attending your journey and procuring these articles, an account of which you are to keep and render upon your return. Given under my hand at head-quarters at Cambridge this 16th day of November, Anno Domini, 1775.





Ancestor History—John, Lake, & Michael Coffeen—by Bill Coffeen

<u>John Coffeen</u> was born in 1727 in Topsfield, MA (north of Boston). His parents were Michael and Lydia (Lake) Coffeen. He married Susanna Goldsmith in 1751 and moved to Middletown, CN on the Connecticut River, His first son, <u>Lake</u>, was born in 1752 followed by a second son John in 1754 and a daughter, Susanna, in 1756. John moves the family to what is now Rindge, NH in early 1758. Their fourth child, <u>Michael</u>, is born soon thereafter.

Timeline of the Coffeen family in the American Revolution:

1775

Early 1775 – Lake enlists in Col. Woodbridge's Massachusetts regiment.

April 19 – Battles of Lexington and Concord, siege of Boston starts May 1 – Lake re-enlists through Oct 1775

May 10 – Michael travels to Massachusetts and enlists in Col Doolittle's Regiment. Both Lake and Michael are deployed in the Siege of Boston.

June 17th – Battle of Bunker Hill

July 3: Washington assumes command of the Continental Army

November 13: Patriots occupy Montreal

December 31: American forces fail to secure Quebec

1776

March 17: British evacuate Boston

Spring: A Company of militia is formed under the command of Cpt. John Coffeen (age 49)

July 4: Declaration of Independence

September 15: British occupy New York City

October 15: Benjamin Whitcomb's (age 39) forms an Independent Corps of Rangers at the request of General Gates 1777

January 15: Representatives from the "New Hampshire Grants" declare the independence of Vermont,

March 8: Michael enlists in Whitcomb's Independent Corps of Ranger, a militia group of spies and scouts with a bounty on their head.

Coffeens in the American Revolution, continued from preceding page:

1777 (cont'd)

May: Cpt. John Coffeen is asked to represent Cavendish, VT at the new constitutional convention.

July 5-6: British retake Forts Ticonderoga and Crown Point

July 7: Battle of Hubbardton (only significant engagement fought in the "Grants"). Despite losses, the Green Mountain Boys fight a successful rear guard action. Michael Coffeen participated.

August 16: Battle of Bennington. Both Michael and Lake participated. Lake was wounded. September 19: 1st Battle of Freeman's Farm. Whitcomb's Rangers and Michael participated.

October 7: 2nd & decisive Battle of Freeman's Farm. Whitcomb's Rangers and Michael participated.

October 17: Burgoyne surrenders at Saratoga

August-October: Both Lake & Michael Coffeen fight at the Battles of Bennington and the Saratoga campaigns under the flag of the Green Mountain Boys.

1778- April 14: Michael marries Sarah Preston. First son is born in 1779

1780- November 11: Michael discharged from the Rangers

1781- February 17: Michael's 2nd son is born. He continues to serve Vermont and his country as part of his father's command until the Peace Treaty is signed.

1782- Michael becomes one of the first missionaries for the Universalist Church

1791- Vermont is admitted to the union on March 4.

1802—Cpt John Coffeen dies in Cavendish, VT, age 75.

Our program featured Scott Johnson, Chairman of the Georgia Council on Literacy. Scott shared insights on the Council's mission to improve literacy outcomes statewide and drew on his years of service on the State Board of Education, Georgia Student Finance Commission, and more. We appreciate his leadership and thoughtful remarks.

Scott previously served for a decade on the State Board of Education (2013-2022) including serving as Chairman of the State Board. He has also served as commissioner on the Georgia Student Finance Commission, and board member of Stone Mountain Memorial Association. He also currently serves as a member of the Georgia Board of Human Services.

Professionally, Scott is founder and principal owner of Southern Strategic Solutions, LLC (S3), a business & government consulting firm based in Marietta. He has been chairman of the Cobb County Republican Party and 11th Congressional District chair of the Georgia Republican Party.

About Literacy in Georgia: In 2023, the Georgia General Assembly passed, and Governor Kemp signed into law, two significant bills that address the state's literacy rates: House Bill 538 and Senate Bill 211.

HB 538 requires kindergarten through third grade reading instruction to be based on the science of reading. Senate Bill 211 created the Georgia Council on Literacy, a 30-member council appointed by the Governor, Lt. Governor, and Speaker of the House. The Council's primary responsibility is to ensure the implementation of the science of reading instruction in every Georgia public school. The Council is also responsible for community engagement, research of literacy efforts in other states, and prioritizing low income, minority and ESOL students.

Upcoming Veterans-Related Activities

Members of the Captain John Collins Chapter, and their families, deserve a lot of credit for their support for veterans and veterans' programs. As we move from summer into fall, it's a good time to pause and update your record of creditable activities in support veterans in 2025. The NSSAR Stark Points Tracker is a great way to document your veterans-related activities, year over year, as you accumulate points towards a Service to Veterans Medal (5,000 points) or Oak Leaf Cluster(s) (3,000 points each). As you update your records it's also a good time to plan ahead for some important upcoming events.

Fall Clothing Campaign for Homeless Veterans (formerly Operation Stand Down)

The Chapter continues to gather new and gently worn fall and winter clothing for donation to homeless veterans. A needs list will be distributed at the September 16th chapter meeting. Donations will be collected at the October 21st meeting and donated the following week.

Five Patriot Grave Marking Ceremony

The Button Gwinnett, Blue Ridge Mountains, Joseph Habersham. Lyman Hall, Piedmont, and Robert Forsyth Chapters will sponsor a 5 Patriot Grave Marking Ceremony at 11 A.M on Saturday November 1st at the City of Sugar Hill Historic Cemetery. No Stark points are earned, but the symbolic importance of today's veterans saluting America's first veterans remains timeless.

Veterans Day Observances

Veterans Day (11-11-2025) falls on a Tuesday this year. That day many local restaurants and national restaurant chains will honor veterans with a free lunch or dinner. Patriotic organizations and many National Cemeteries will host events the following Saturday.

Wreaths Across America Day

Wreaths Across America Day will be observed on December 13, 2025. On that day wreaths will be placed at the gravesites of veterans nationwide in recognition of their service and sacrifices. Major observances will take place at the Marietta, Georgia, and Andersonville National Cemeteries as well as the Georgia Veterans Memorial Cemetery at Milledgeville, GA. Special pricing for wreaths is available to members of the GASSAR, and wreaths you order can be delivered to any of the thousands of cemeteries served by Wreaths Across America. This enables Compatriots to participate in a local wreaths event, and at the same time memorialize friends or loved ones who rest in far-away places. The GASSAR member discount code is GA0057, and each order of three wreaths earns a \$5 credit towards the purchase of additional wreaths

BG Robert L Scott, Jr. and USS Stark Memorial Award Competition

The Captain John Collins Chapter figures prominently in state and national service-to-veterans competitions. The GASSAR's Brigadier General Robert L. Scott, Jr. competition is based on Stark award reporting and recognizes the winning chapters with 10-24 members, 25-49 members, 50-99 members, and 100+ members. The NSSAR's USS Stark Memorial Award Competition ranks competing chapters based on the number of members – 10 to 49, 50 to 99, 100 to 199, and 200+ members. Every competing chapter receives a certificate of appreciation from the NSSAR, and additional recognition goes to chapters that sponsor events in cooperation with other Partners in Patriotism.

Patriot Levi Truett is the 6th great-grandfather of our chapter compatriot, Robert Blackwell.

Levi Truett was born about 1750 in Worcester, Maryland. About 1770 Levi married Ann Virginia Phillips. Their daughter, Rebecca was born on April 1, 1771, their son Levi Marion was born in 1775.

In the summer of 1777, Levi enlisted as a Private in Co. F, Capt. Nathaniel Mitchell's Company of Foot which was part of Col. William Grayson's Additional Continental Regiment. At the time of his enlistment the unit was assigned to the 4th Virginia Brigade as part of the main Continental Army.

Levi is shown on the company muster roll from September to December 1777. During this time, his unit was in the Battle of Brandywine, fought on September 11, 1777, and the Battle of Germantown on Octo-

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ber 4, 1777. Grayson's Regiment was one of the units that wintered at Valley Forge beginning on December 19, 1777.

On the company records, Levi was already shown as being in the hospital on December 1, 1777. He died on December 27, 1777.





250 years ago...1775





18 Oct 1775—The British Royal Navy burn Falmouth (modern day Portland, Maine).

27 Oct 1775—George Washington suspects Dr. Benjamin Church, the Surgeon General of the Continental Army, of being a spy and has him arrested. It was determined that Dr. Church was sending coded letters to General Gage in Boston. Dr. Church is placed on trial for treason on 2 Nov 1775 and found guilty. He is expelled from Massachusetts.

7 Nov 1775—Lord Dunmore's Proclamation (Royal Governor of Virginia) - offering freedom to slaves if they fight for the British.

13 Nov 1775—American forces under General Richard Montgomery capture Montreal

5 Dec 1775—Henry Knox arrives at Ft. Ticonderoga and begins collecting the cannon to take to General Washington at Cambridge, MA.

9 Dec 1775—Battle of Great Bridge, near Norfolk, VA. Victory for the American militia that led to the British abandoning Norfolk.

31 Dec 1775—Battle of Quebec. Fought in a fierce snow storm. The American assault is repulsed. Gen Richard Montgomery is killed, General Benedict Arnold is wounded, and Col Henry Morgan is captured.
